The third set was much like the first in that the Sting were able to get an early lead. After getting down 12-7 the Thunder were able to come back to tie it up and soon after take the lead.


Anton said the team wasn't committed to the play at times and that their passing also wasn't always very good.

"Calgary was a peaking opportunity for us," said Anton.

"But after each peak is a decline. I think now we're starting to get back to our game," he said.

He said the team usually serves well, which is something he was happy with in
